Founded in Punta Arenas, Chile, the company revolutionized Antarctic travel in 2003 with its innovative air-cruise model, offering a comfortable two-hour flight to King George Island followed by an intimate expedition cruise along the Antarctic Peninsula.

The Debut of Our Air-Cruises

Co-founder and President of Antarctica21 Jaime Vásquez shares the company's origin story. In December 2003, a group of entrepreneurs from the Magallanes region of Chile organized what would become Antarctica21's first pilot trip — when the concept of Antarctic fly-and-cruise expeditions was unprecedented.

Twenty years ago, we embarked on a revolutionary adventure that would change Antarctic travel forever. Our first air-cruise took flight with just 13 paying guests aboard a De Havilland Dash-7, landing on King George Island. The sea voyage continued on the modest *Grigoriy Mikheev*, a former research vessel and a far cry from our current boutique ships.

As I sat in the airport, an overwhelming sense of excitement coursed through me. Antarctica was uncharted territory, promising a primordial world waiting to be explored. Upon arrival, the landscape's majesty left me humbled and moved. The gigantic icebergs and the stark absence of vegetation created an otherworldly experience that deeply impacted all of us.

Each evening, we gathered to share stories and refine our vision for the future. The conversations were electric with possibility. Flying back to Punta Arenas, I interviewed our travel companions, eager to capture their reactions. Their teary-eyed, thrilled responses confirmed what I had sensed: we had created something extraordinary.

This inaugural journey taught me that our venture was more than just logistics and resources. We were touching people on a profound level, evoking intense emotions and deep joy. I realized then that our business needed heart and soul to succeed.

That insight and passion have guided us for two decades, expressed through our extraordinary teams and the strong relationships we've built worldwide. Looking back, I could never have imagined what Antarctica21 would become. The pride I feel in what we've created is immeasurable. Our air-cruise innovation has indeed revolutionized Antarctic travel, making the White Continent more accessible while preserving its power to inspire and transform.

Protecting and Understanding the 7th Continent

Edgardo Vega, Executive Director and Founder of the Antarctica21 Foundation

Since 2021, the Antarctica21 Foundation has developed educational, cultural, and scientific initiatives that connect Antarctica to those who cannot visit in person and contribute to spreading Antarctic knowledge. Edgardo Vega, Executive Director and Founder of the organization, tells us more about the Foundation.

What inspired the creation of the Antarctica21 Foundation?

Our Foundation was born from a deep passion for Antarctica and a recognition of its global importance. We saw a need to bridge the gap between scientific research and public understanding. After years of facilitating travel to Antarctica, we realized we had a unique opportunity – and responsibility – to promote education, conservation, and research about this fragile ecosystem.

Can you explain the Foundation's mission and vision?

Our mission is to foster appreciation and social ownership of Antarctic knowledge.

We believe in the transformational power of exploration and scientific research. Our vision is to create a world where people understand Antarctica's key role on Earth, and can make informed decisions about its future.

What are some of the Foundation's most important achievements so far?

We're proud of several initiatives. Our "Science Onboard" program has established partnerships with universities and research centers, implementing long-term scientific studies during Antarctica21 expeditions. Our "Green Energy" project explores using hydrogen as a sustainable energy source for Antarctic bases. We have also created "ILAN", an Antarctic-themed board game that aims to bring Antarctic knowledge into schools. Additionally, we published "Antarctica: Notes for a Logbook," a photography book that gives readers a glimpse into the icy world of the Last Continent. It is available in Explorers House's gift shop. For the last three years, we have organized tournaments in Chilean schools locally and nationally and awarded



the winners with a trip to Antarctica! The latest edition took place between August 25 and September 11, 2024, and included events in eight cities, with hundreds of participants.

What exciting projects are on the horizon for the Antarctica21 Foundation?

We're particularly excited about our "Artists in Antarctica" project, which brings together Chilean artists inspired by Antarctica, creating a unique synergy between art and science. We're also expanding our educational programs to reach more students and communities globally. Looking ahead, we're focusing on developing innovative conservation initiatives and strengthening our international collaborations to amplify our impact in preserving Antarctica for future generations.

To prepare physically, Diane walked 12 miles daily, three times a week. The pair packed Canada Goose Arctic Program outerwear, though Diane admitted to overpacking regular winter clothes.

During the trip, Diane participated in the Citizen Science program, testing waters for plankton. She was pleasantly surprised by the friendliness of the Antarctica21 staff and crew. Highlights included visiting Port Lockroy and an unexpected Texas-style barbecue on the ship's deck.

Diane particularly enjoyed traveling with her son: "I felt like I was traveling with a rockstar or a famous actor. World Wide Nate, my son, Nathan Fluellen, is a gregarious person. When he shares his professional career in the film industry, along with his world travels and international influencer associations, people are drawn to him."

The mother-son duo's Antarctic journey exemplifies the power of travel to strengthen family bonds. As Nate puts it, "Time is precious. It's valuable to cherish the time we have with our parents."

Hiking & Snowshoeing

Polar Plunge or Polar Run



Wildlife Encounters Along the Antarctic Peninsula




PENGUINS — They are abundant along the Peninsula. Gentoo penguins, with their distinctive white eye patches and orange beaks, nest on rocky outcrops. Adélies, in their classic "tuxedo" plumage, form large colonies in ice-free areas. Chinstrap penguins, named for the thin black line under their heads, can be spotted on steep, rocky slopes. During your visit, you may witness these agile swimmers porpoising through the water or observe their comical waddling on land.









SEALS — Several seal species call the Peninsula home. Weddell seals, known for their docile nature and cat-like faces, often bask on ice floes. The formidable leopard seals, with their spotted coats and reptilian heads, patrol the waters for penguin prey. You might also encounter the blubbery elephant seals or the more numerous crabeater seals.

WHALES — The nutrient-rich waters attract various migrating whale species. Humpback whales are common, often seen breaching or tail slapping. Sleek minke whales, the smallest of the baleen whales, frequently approach vessels out of curiosity. Orcas, or killer whales, with their distinctive and unmistakable black-and-white coloration, hunt in family pods.

SEABIRDS — The skies and cliffs teem with avian life. Massive wandering albatrosses soar overhead while smaller snow petrels flit across the waves. Antarctic skuas and giant petrels act as the cleanup crew, scavenging along the shores. Blue-eyed shags nest on coastal cliffs, diving for fish in the shallow waters.

Inside Explorers House: An Architectural Oasis in Punta Arenas



In the heart of Punta Arenas, Explorers House stands as Antarctica21's welcome center—a 2,000-square-meter (21,528-square-feet) fusion of history, sustainability, and modern design. Architect Pedro Kovacic and interior designer Enrique Concha have transformed this former wool warehouse into a gateway to Antarctic adventure.

Upon entering, visitors are greeted by warm textures and turquoise flooring, evoking Antarctic icebergs. The space features a theatrestyle presentation room, library, garden area, shop, bar, and restaurant serving regional Chilean fare.

Kovacic's vision was to preserve the building's history while adding contemporary elements. "I didn't want to touch the building's history; I left it as it was, in its stained, natural state," he explains. The original wooden structure remains, reinforced with a black metal framework.

Concha faced the challenge of creating an interior reflecting Antarctica21's identity. "We decided to use a color palette of black, turquoise, and red," he says, mirroring the Antarctic environment and the company's signature elements.

Sustainability is key, aligning with Antarctica21's environmental commitment. The building features rainwater harvesting, solar panels, and radiant heating floors. Concha adds, "Much of the upholstery is made from industrial waste and recycled into fibers." The collaboration has resulted in a deeply inspirational space. "It's the spirit of Antarctica21; we wanted to capture their regional, Patagonian spirit," Concha explains.

Explorers House is more than a starting point; it is a gateway to the Antarctic experience. As Kovacic puts it, "I want Antarctica21 guests who arrive at Explorers House to be surprised, to feel something unexpected, something that surpasses their expectations."

This architectural oasis embodies Antarctica21's commitment to providing an experience that begins before guests set foot on the Antarctic continent, celebrating the past while embracing the future."

How to Photograph Antarctica Responsibly?

Many dream of photographing Antarctica, which offers breathtaking landscapes and unique wildlife. However, it's crucial to approach this responsibly to preserve the pristine environment and protect its inhabitants. Rodrigo Moraga, photographer and guide at Antarctica21, shares eight tips to ensure your photography is both ethical and impactful.

| LEARN ABOUT THE ANIMALS

Understanding animal behavior is essential for capturing incredible wildlife shots without causing stress. Familiarize yourself with the species you plan to photograph to anticipate their movements and recognize signs of distress.

2 BE SILENT AND KEEP A LOW PROFILE

Loud noises and sudden movements can easily frighten animals in Antarctica. Stay quiet, move slowly, and maintain a low profile to avoid disturbing them. Flash photography is not allowed; it might spook the animals.

3 APPLY RULES OF COMPOSITION

Good composition is key to stunning photos. Use the rule of thirds to create balanced and engaging images. Align your subjects along the grid lines or at their intersections to enhance visual interest.

4 BE PATIENT

Wildlife photography requires patience. Spend time observing your subjects and waiting for the perfect moment to capture their natural behavior. It takes time and patience to get that ideal shot.

5 LOOK OUT FOR SIGNS OF DISTRESS

If an animal shows signs of distress, stop photographing immediately and move away. The well-being of wildlife should always come first. Avoid getting too close, especially during sensitive times like nesting or feeding.

6 USE COMMON SENSE

Respectful photography often relies on instinct. If you question whether a shot is ethical, it probably isn't. Always prioritize the animals' right of way and avoid obstructing their paths. Leave no trace by unpacking all your gear and leaving waste behind.

7 WATCH YOUR STEP

Be mindful of where you walk to avoid trampling fragile environments and disturbing wildlife habitats. Stick to designated paths and be aware of nesting areas, particularly those hidden under the snow or vegetation.

8 ENJOY THE MOMENT

Sometimes, the best way to appreciate Antarctica's beauty is to put the camera down and take in the scene with your own eyes. Fully immerse yourself in the experience and cherish the memories beyond the lens. "Antarctica engrains you with a certain type of awareness of the planet and your place in it. There is no other experience like Antarctica. I can't wait to return."
